- Hitler saw Slavs as racially inferior peoples who should be made to serve the German nation.
- Non-German European workers eventually made up 20 percent of Germany's labor force.
- Pulling large numbers of workers out of occupied countries to work in Germany disrupted industrial production that could have served Germany.
- Brutal treatment of foreign workers led to resistance against Nazi occupation forces.


Those who survived the concentration camps were left with a permanent physical reminder, in the form of tattoos of their prisoner number.






World War II Deaths
